**PEOPLE SCRUTINY PANEL REVISIT REPORT ON PLAY, PLAYGROUNDS AND  
OPEN SPACES IN NORTH LINCOLNSHIRE – PROGRESS REPORT & ACTION PLAN**

**1. OBJECT AND KEY POINTS IN THIS REPORT**

- 1.1 To consider an update on progress achieved to date and a plan of further actions proposed in response to the revisit report of the People Scrutiny Panel on Play, Playgrounds and Open Spaces in North Lincolnshire.

**2. BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

- 2.1 The People Scrutiny Panel has undertaken a revisit of the former Children and Young People Scrutiny Panel's review of Play, Playgrounds and Open Spaces in North Lincolnshire. They published their report in July 2012. Cabinet considered this matter on 25 September 2012. They *resolved "that the Cabinet Member for People and the Director of People consider the contents of the report and prepare an action plan in response to the recommendations for submission to a future meeting of Cabinet"*.
- 2.2 The matter was referred to the Director of Places for action in May 2013.

**3. OPTIONS FOR CONSIDERATION**

- 3.1 Attached to this paper is an update of progress achieved to date and proposals for further action in response to the recommendations of the Scrutiny Panel. Cabinet has the option of approving the plan. Alternatively, Cabinet might want to suggest amendments to the plan.

**4. ANALYSIS OF OPTIONS**

- 4.1 The progress update and action plan attempts to deal with the recommendations of the Scrutiny Panel in full. Cabinet is therefore recommended to approve the plan.
- 4.2 The progress achieved to date set out in the appendix demonstrates the council's continuing strong commitment to facilitating a wide range of opportunities for young people to participate in play and enjoy active and healthy lifestyles. The Scrutiny Panel noted a number of improvements since the subject was first considered in 2008/09. These included a range of excellent new facilities across North Lincolnshire, new modern playgrounds and a host of activities tailored to the needs of children and young people.

The information in the appendix demonstrates continuing improvement in this area, including the following examples.

- Work in hand in partnership with eighteen community and voluntary groups across the area toward providing more positive activities for young people, including new provision during school holidays.
- Increased provision of activities for young people in a number of locations across North Lincolnshire with plans in place for further development.
- Supporting participation in the Duke of Edinburgh award programme enabling young people to achieve up to and including the gold award level.
- Examples of seventeen new activities specifically targeted at young people introduced since the publication of the Scrutiny Panel report in July 2012.
- A significant increase in community grant funding, now totalling almost £1m, that supports community based projects related to play and youth engagement and specific capital funding allocated to projects to develop skate parks, multi use games areas and a climbing wall at the Pods..
- Continuing support in providing the free swim programme for young people during the summer period that saw over 25,000 visits to swimming pools across the area in 2012, an increase of 7% on the previous year.

## **5. RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS (FINANCIAL, STAFFING, PROPERTY, IT)**

5.1 The proposed plan may have implications with regard to finance, staffing and property resources depending on the outcome of individual actions. These will be fully evaluated as any consequential recommendations for change are subsequently brought forward for consideration.

## **6. OUTCOMES IF INTEGRATED IMPACT ASSESSMENT (IF APPLICABLE)**

6.1 Officers will prepare Integrated Impact assessments relating to specific actions arising from the attached plan.

## **7. OUTCOMES OF CONSULTATION AND CONFLICTS OF INTEREST DECLARED**

7.1 Relevant officers from across the council have contributed to the preparation of the action plan presented for consideration by Cabinet.

7.2 The Scrutiny Panel consulted widely with elected members, relevant officers and young people in revisiting the original report and prior to publishing their eight further recommendations in July 2012.

7.2 The Chairman of the People Scrutiny Panel was provided with a draft copy of this paper and the accompanying appendix for comment. She indicated that she was happy with the information as presented.

## 8. RECOMMENDATIONS

8.1 That Cabinet approves the action plan attached to this report.
