**CHILD SEXUAL EXPLOITATION IN NORTH LINCOLNSHIRE – ACTION PLAN IN
RESPONSE TO A REPORT BY THE PLACES SCRUTINY PANEL**

1. OBJECT AND KEY POINTS IN THIS REPORT

- 1.1 To present the action plan in response to the Places Scrutiny Panel report on child sexual exploitation in North Lincolnshire.
- 1.1.1 The report provides a summary of the progress made to date.
- 1.1.2 The Action Plan also contains updates outlining progress and ongoing work to deliver the Scrutiny Panel recommendations.

2. BACKGROUND INFORMATION

- 2.1 The issue of protecting children from sexual exploitation is a key national and local priority. It continues to receive a great deal of media attention. The Office of the Children's Commissioner's Inquiry into Child Sexual Exploitation (CSE) was published in 2012. The inquiry highlighted that CSE was widespread. This applies to both rural and urban areas. In addition, that both victims and perpetrators came from a range of ethnic and social backgrounds.
- 2.2 With this in mind, the Places Scrutiny Panel undertook a review into this key issue. The aim was to ensure that North Lincolnshire had embedded in its safeguarding children procedures robust and comprehensive systems to identify support and protect children and young people from CSE. The scrutiny panel focused on a number of key issues:
- To develop an understanding of the potential scale and nature of this issue in North Lincolnshire
 - To establish levels of professional awareness of this issue
 - To consider what interventions are available, and which of these are currently being utilised in North Lincolnshire and whether there are any gaps in provision
 - To identify any examples of good practice
 - Raise public awareness of this issue.

2.3 Cabinet received the Places Scrutiny Panel report on CSE in April 2014. They fully endorsed the recommendations contained in the report.

2.4 Officers have pulled together both the Scrutiny Panel recommendations and priorities identified by the Local Safeguarding Children Board into a revised Strategy and Action Plan. The aim is to ensure that all agencies continue to drive this work forward, work in partnership and cooperate to tackle all forms of CSE.

2.5 An updated Action Plan is attached at appendix 1. The plan sets out progress achieved to date in addressing the issues raised by the Scrutiny Panel as well as the ongoing work to respond to their various recommendations.

3. OPTIONS FOR CONSIDERATION

3.1 Cabinet has the following options for consideration:

3.1.1 **Option 1** – To approve the report and Action Plan.

3.1.2 **Option 2** – Not approve the report and Action Plan.

4. ANALYSIS OF OPTIONS

4.1 Option 1 is the preferred option. The documents set out the significant progress made to date and the ongoing actions against each of the Scrutiny Panel's recommendations.

5. RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS (FINANCIAL, STAFFING, PROPERTY, IT)

5.1 There are no resource implications directly associated with this report.

6. OUTCOMES OF INTEGRATED IMPACT ASSESSMENT (IF APPLICABLE)

6.1 Protecting children from sexual exploitation is a statutory duty for a number of partner agencies. The report and attachments reflect the ongoing commitment to continuous improvement towards achieving the highest possible standards when discharging these statutory obligations.

7. OUTCOMES OF CONSULTATION

7.1 The CSE Strategic Group has led the development and implementation of the CSE Action Plan. All key partners are represented on the group.

7.2 The Places Scrutiny Panel considered the Action Plan at their meeting held on 10 September 2014. They support the information it contains.
