PROGRESS REPORT ON THE OUTCOMES OF THE SCRUTINY REVIEW OF SEXUAL HEALTH SERVICES

1. OBJECT AND KEY POINTS IN THIS REPORT

- 1.1 To update Cabinet on the progress of implementing the recommendations of the Health Scrutiny Review of Sexual Health Services.

2. BACKGROUND INFORMATION

- 2.1 The Health Scrutiny Panel undertook a review into Sexual Health and Wellbeing in 2016. The review's aims were to ensure that services were sufficiently joined up and that services were responsive and accessible to local people.

The scope of the review noted that there are a number of agencies and organisations involved in the provision of sexual health services including GPs, Specialist Services and School Nurses. Therefore the scope sought to consider and understand how the services worked together to support North Lincolnshire's residents.

The report was published in June 2017.

- 2.2 The Health and Social Care Act (2012) included provision to transfer the commissioning for sexual and reproductive healthcare from local NHS organisations to local authorities with the expectation that a more holistic approach to sexual health and wellbeing would be achieved.

- 2.3 The Local Authority commissions comprehensive open access sexual health services including;

- Advice and Information
- A full range of contraception methods
- STI screening, testing, treatment and partner notification
- Sexual health aspect of psychosexual counselling
- Testing for pregnancy

The Clinical Commissioning Group is the responsible commissioner for acute and chronic gynaecology services and the psychological support

associated with psychosexual needs.

NHS England is the responsible commissioner for specialist sexual health services including treatment for HIV.

2.4 Outcomes associated with effective sexual health services are very positive in North Lincolnshire:

- Teenage pregnancy rates in North Lincolnshire have continued to fall with the rate being below the England average. North Lincolnshire has been identified as being in the top third of Local Authorities in respect of the rate of reduction between 2010 and 2015.
- Performance with respect to the National Chlamydia Screening Programme is amongst the best in the country.
- The provision of Long Acting Reversible Contraception in Primary Care is at a higher level than the England average.

2.5 The Health Scrutiny panel made six recommendations.

2.6 All six recommendations have been implemented. Appendix 1 provides detail of the recommendations and action taken.

3.1 This report is to provide Cabinet with an update on the progress made in relation to the recommendations arising out of the scrutiny review and as such there are no options for consideration.
