### 1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The purpose of this report is to provide the Police and Crime Panel with an update on the work of the OPCC specifically surrounding efforts on securing additional resources for the area.

### 2. RECOMMENDATIONS

It is recommended that Members of the Police and Crime Panel use this report as background information to support oversight of the work of the PCC.

### 3. SUMMARY

Humberside OPCC have been successful in securing several funding applications, submitted into the Home Office (HO) and to the Ministry of Justice (MoJ).

The bids were in relation to additional funding needs for Domestic Abuse and Sexual Violence services, to meet increasing demand across Humberside.

Additional bids into the Home Office were also successful in relation to Community Safety in the West Marsh (North East Lincolnshire). An environmental design project called Safer Streets, to design out crime and meet priorities for the community and a hot spot policing bid to increase police resources in high crime areas.

In total the successful bids have generated £1.6m worth of additional investment within Humberside from the start of the PCC term of office.

There are 2 further applications which await approval for Safer Streets projects in the area of St Andrews, University and city centre in Hull which aim to tackle serious acquisitive crime, violence against women and girls and safety of women in the night time economy.

### 4. PROJECT SUMMARIES

#### 4.1 Increased Independent Domestic Violence Advocate (IDVA) workforce across Humberside (£202,486)

Increased workforce capacity in all 4 local authority areas to cope with the increased demand and concern for harm in relation to domestic abuse.

4.2 Increased Independent Sexual Violence Advocate (ISVA) workforce across Humberside (£105,000)

Increased advocacy and support for victims and survivors of sexual violence (SV). For survivors who want support to navigate the criminal justice system, have an advocate to support them throughout all stages of their journey.

4.3 Emergency funding for third sector providers in Sexual Violence and Domestic Abuse sector (£250,864)

Emergency funding to:

- Support organisations to meet accommodation costs,
- Address significant waiting lists for sexual violence and domestic abuse counselling and therapeutic support.
- Provides emergency packs for young victims
- DA and SV campaign(s) to increase resilience and awareness, in association with Hull University.

4.4 Child Adolescent Parental Violence (CAPV) programme Humberside (£200,000)

Training and resources to Social Care and Early Help services and family based practitioners in CAPV. It will complement and enhance existing provision, enabling a wider pool of practitioners equipped to deliver to this agenda in a sustainable and coordinated model (which is emerging as a demand area). This also builds on the existing service provision for 'Who's in Charge?' – A South bank commissioned CAPV service.

4.5 Male Rape support fund Humberside (£56,000)

Support for our partner agency The Blue Door to deliver a peer led recovery model for male victims of rape and sexual violence, supporting and counselling those affected by these crimes

4.6 Science, Technology, Analysis & Research (STAR) partnership project (£126,500)

Joint partnership feasibility study with the Criminology team at the University of Hull, Police and OPCC – trial featuring provision of audio alarms to high risk DA victims to act as a deterrent to perpetrators and with the ability to capture audio to aid evidence based prosecutions.

4.7 Safer Streets 2, West Marsh North East Lincolnshire (£432,000)

Joint project with North East Lincolnshire Local Authority. Funding supports local initiatives designed to prevent and reduce neighbourhood crime and improve the environment: Burglary, Robbery, Vehicle Crime and Theft from the Person.

#### 4.8 Hot spot Policing across hot spots in Humberside (£390,000)

The funding will enhance Humberside Police's operational policing response to serious violence in public spaces by identifying micro-areas experiencing or at risk of serious violence, and conducting high-visibility patrols in such areas to tackle and suppress serious violence. Officers will be regularly cycled through serious violence hotspots using uniformed foot patrols of 15-20 minute duration, with guidance to engage with the public and businesses to ensure their presence is visible.

### 5. **NEXT STEPS**

The Contracts and Commissioning Team will be focussed on further pipeline for opportunities as well as resourcing the oversight and contract management for those opportunities that result in commissioned service providers.

The Head of Policy and Partnerships is monitoring resource requirements of the OPCC to ensure that as more income is generated that we can ensure quality of service can be maintained whilst ensuring capacity for new income generation is maximised.
